1. Beekeeper's hives on the Saint Johns River

1939 (circa)

"The Yearling was a Pulitzer Prize winning novel by Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings, published in 1938, about a young boy and his pet deer in Florida's Big Scrub. That same year, Rawlings sold the film rights of the book to MGM for \$30,000. In 1939, the studio sent art directors to north-central Florida to scout locations with Rawlings and gather visual research of Florida. They eventually leased a farm, planted crops, and began remodeling the farm to be used as an exterior set for the Baxter family farm. Filming was set to begin in 1940 in North Central Florida under director Victor Fleming with Spencer Tracy, Gene Eckman, Anne Revere and Tully Marshall. Several conflicts led to film's cancellation by the studio after two months. After World War II, the studio finally completed the film in 1947 with Gregory Peck, Claude Jarman, and Jane Wyman." source: PR25459 (State Archives of FL/ Print collections Box 1, FF3 /Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer/ Rawlings, Marjorie Kinnan, 1896-1953)

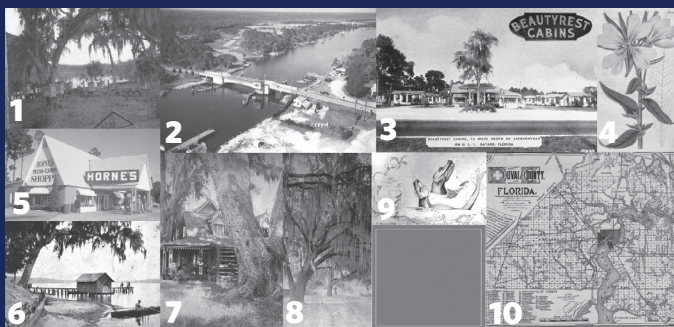

"Horne's was a tourist candy and souvenir store located throughout the country, but especially in the south. Begun by Bob Horne in Bayard, Florida (which later was incorporated into Jacksonville) on US 1. Horne originally sold candy to Stuckey's, but later created his own chain of stores. The stores were known for their bright yellow roofs. "Bottom figure represents the action of this terrible monster when they bellow in the Spring Season. They force the water out of their throat which falls from their mouth like a Cataract and a steam or vapour from their nostrils like smoke. The top figure represents them rising up out of the water when they devour the fish. From the standpoint of natural history, perhaps the most important drawing ever executed by Bartram." source: PR00131 (State Archives of FL/ Bartram, William, 1739-1823).
